I Want My Church to Grow



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Many people yearn to help grow the church. Parishioners talk to me about it, the Vestry talks about it, the Open Door Task Group has worked on it, the Marketing Action Group wrestles with it. Trinity wants to grow. An anonymous parishioner put a pamphlet on my desk with helpful practical advice about growing the church. Thanks to that, I can share that advice with you in what I hope will be several articles in the *Trinity Times*.

The Spirit is Willing; the
Flesh is Weak

I believe that most parishioners want to share the good news about how we have come to know Christ in the church, and how our lives have been enriched through the church, and we do believe that our lives can be enhanced through the experiences, hopes, and talents that new members can bring to us as well as what we can give of the same. It is certainly Jesus' desire that we grow the church. The last thing Jesus told us before he ascended was an admonition to grow the church. "Go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the

Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit (Matthew 28:19)."

Where we find ourselves stuck is knowing how to help grow the church. I am going to write about ten simple things you can do right now to grow Trinity Church. This article tells about three of them.

Pray for Growth. How prayer works is a mystery beyond easy explanation, but whatever we ask in the name of Jesus will be fulfilled. Make praying for Trinity to grow a part of your personal prayer — it will be fulfilled in you. In the prayers of the people on Sunday, pray aloud for the growth of the church. I will try to include a prayer for the growth of the church at every service, but you can make it happen by adding your own. Parishes who pray for growth usually do grow. That is what they say, and I believe them.

Worship Regularly. Nothing deepens our relationship with Christ and increases our excitement about our church more than regularly being present to break the bread and say the prayers. People from outside will witness the depth of your

regular commitment and emulate it. Those around you will see the seriousness of your faith when you make Sunday worship a priority. When you are there regularly, you will know who the newcomers are, and be able to greet them.

Learn People's Names. God knows us intimately and personally. Jesus calls us each by name. We are baptized by name. There is no more powerful sign of being part of the community than to be called by name. Take the time and make the effort — even if it seems awkward and embarrassing — to learn people's names and greet them personally. This is not only an act of kindness, it says something about how we understand God's love for us in Christ as the one who truly knows and loves us.

That's three ways to help Trinity grow. More next time. — from *Jim Ransom*

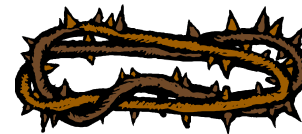

Companions for Our Struggle

Five Sunday Evenings with Some Amazing Christians

Led by The Rev. James C. Ransom

We need all the help we can get in our struggle to be faithful Christians. Mentors and friends can make a big difference in our faith journeys as they offer wisdom, support, encouragement and correction to us along the way. This Lent, I would like to introduce you to five amazing Christians, whose witness and writings have inspired those around them to a deeper life in Christ. Their words continue to be read for their wisdom and insight. And, at the same time, these are five ordinary Christians like ourselves, who face, with us, all the challenges and temptations that are ours.

Here's How It Works

You are invited to gather in Memorial Hall from 5:30 to 6:15 a.m. for a light supper of salad, meat/fish and vegetarian pie, and fruit dessert. From 6:15 to 7:00 p.m., we will gather in the Lee Chapel for a hymn, reading from Scripture, meditation and reflection centered on one of the five spiritual writers, time for personal reflection, and a closing prayer. Our time together will be enhanced by visual imagery to focus our meditation. The Rev. Joseph M. Rushton will lead a program for children. Kathleen Capcara will coordinate the presentation of meals.

Sunday, March 1, 2009

C. S. Lewis. A reserved professor of medieval literature at Magdalen College, Oxford, for most of his life, C. S. Lewis was “surprised by joy” in 1931, when he converted to Christianity. His life changed as he wrote and spoke (mostly on the radio) what have become classics of Christian spirituality. *Mere Christianity* is his most enlivening work. Countless Christians point to reading this book as an essential moment of conversion in their lives, and especially to the part we will share that talks about how much of myself is enough for God. The Scripture passage will be Luke 14:25-33.

Sunday, March 8, 2009

Julian of Norwich. This late 14th century mystic was the first woman known to write a book in the English language, her *Revelations of Divine Love*. Her work was largely unknown until the 1970s, when a contemporary English version of her *Revelations* was published. After 600 years of silence, Julian is now one of the most widely read women spiritual writers. She would be amazed. The passage we will consider focuses on the “Immeasurable Love” of God for us, and how we access this inexhaustible love in prayer. The Scripture passage is Psalm 8, “O Lord our Savior, how majestic is your name in all the earth.”

Sunday, March 15, 2009

William Temple may be the most outstanding Christian leader of the 20th century. A true son of the church from birth, Temple began ministry as chaplain to the Archbishop of Canterbury, then became Bishop of Manchester in 1921, Archbishop of York in 1928, and died as Archbishop of Canterbury in 1944. His writing and preaching moved a whole generation to more intentional social engagement. In the section of his writings we will look at, he discusses the relationship between faith and society, where our prayer and active life in the world meet in acts of compassion. The Scripture passage is Luke 14:7-11.

Sunday, March 22, 2009

Francis of Assisi (1182 – 1226) is a legendary Christian figure. It would be hard for me not to include this saint dear to the hearts of so many of us here at Trinity. I want to use a portion of the *Little Flowers of St. Francis* called the Harvest of Souls to talk about a life centered in the Word of God and a life of proclamation: they go hand-in-hand.

Sunday, March 29, 2009

Kathleen Norris. It’s always good to hear from someone who is still alive. Kathleen will be 62 this year. Another good thing about her is that she lives in South Dakota. A much published author on spiritual matters, she is admired as much for her poetic style as for her insights into everyday life related to God. She finds God in the ordinary and mundane. This is the key to the Incarnational life, the sacramental life so essential to us Episcopalians. I will use a piece from her book *Quotidian Mysteries*.

Spirituality for Hard Times

Streams of Living Water in the Desert

All sessions begin at 10:00 a.m. in Memorial Hall

There has been a sudden and dramatic change in our lives — Economic Depression. Uncertainty causes us to see things differently and we look around for resources to see us through. Like the Hebrews during the forty years that they wandered in the wilderness, we seek streams of living water. In that experience, it was God who struck the rock and the water of compassion gushed out; it was God who gave them food enough to eat. In these difficult times for us, God is there to open for us streams of living water; they are already there, ready for us. Lent is the perfect liturgical time for us to seek these spiritual resources. When we remember the forty days Jesus was in the wilderness, and the forty years of wandering for the Hebrews, we can not only join them in the search for God's grace, we can rejoice with them that God's grace never fails. Come and let the angels of God's grace minister to us streams of living waters.

Sunday, March 1, 2009

Lent I

The Stream of Contemplative Prayer. Distraction and anxiety are critical spiritual problems in a fast-paced world experiencing difficulty. Contemplative prayer is, very simply, a life of paying loving attention to God. Prayer is how we pay attention to God and focus on God's loving attention to us. Prayer is also the way that we set aside our distractions, detach ourselves from anxiety, so that God can be all-in-all. Henri Nouwen writes, "The spiritual life is a gift of the Holy Spirit, who lifts us into God's love."

Sunday, March 15, 2009

Lent II

The Stream of the Virtuous Life. Warren Buffet said recently about the scandals that have come to light in the economic downturn, "When the tide goes out, everyone knows who is wearing a swimsuit, and who isn't!" Virtue — that is, doing what is right and prudent in the eyes of God — is an essential spiritual resource. Virtue is goodness on fire. Come and learn how, as Christians, we can turn aside from self, idolatrous attractions, and indulgent ways, to serve the world and ourselves in doing the virtuous life of God. Paul writes in Romans, "Be not conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what is the good and acceptable and perfect will of God (Romans 12:2)." This session will help us recapture our desire to live the virtues of God.

Sunday, March 15, 2009

Lent III

The Stream of the Spirit-Filled Life. Paul asks, “Do you not know that you are God’s Temple, and that God’s Spirit dwells in you (I Corinthians 3:16)?” As Episcopalians we struggle to accept the joy-filled embrace of the Holy Spirit, but there is no suppressing the Spirit’s power to enliven souls with the overflowing joy and enthusiasm to do their faith with vigor. The psalm asks, “How can we sing a joyful song in a foreign land? By the waters of Babylon we hang up our harps and weep.” The Spirit-filled life carries us through difficult times. Come and discover again the Spirit joyfully at work in your life.

Sunday, March 22, 2009

Lent IV

The Stream of the Word-Centered Life. John proclaims in his Gospel, “The Word became flesh and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth; we have beheld his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father (John 1:14).” At the very heart of our faith is affirmation that the Risen Christ dwells in us and with us — that his Word has been written on our hearts — “Christ in me, the hope of glory.” For Christians, the Word-centered life is about claiming the Scripture as the companionship of the Word with us, but also claiming the Word in us as proclamation — proclaiming the Good News as one sent from God. Come and learn that the Word that is spoken to us is also the Word we have to speak to others.

Sunday, March 29, 2009

Lent V

The Stream of the Sacramental Life. This is the solid rock in the flowing stream of our own tradition as Episcopalians. We understand deeply how much God loves the world God has made, and that the Creation is so good in God’s eyes that God took this nature upon himself in Christ, and uses the “things of the earth” as means of overflowing grace for us. This is the Incarnational life — the sacramental way. It is what Jesus did when at supper, he took bread, gave thanks, broke the bread, and said, “This is my Body which is given for you.” Come and learn how the Sacramental/Incarnational life grounds us in Christ so profoundly that in all the streams and aspects of our lives, we can, amid distractions, have the collectedness to will one thing: in suffering, the patience to will one thing; in joy and gladness, to will one thing, to live in the streams of living water that carry us to God.

Lent Sunday School Rotation Workshops

March 1, 8, 15, 22, & 29

101 Ways to Pray

During this unit, the children in our three levels of Sunday school will experience many different ways to pray. This rotation will help children become more familiar with different prayer traditions from our Christian heritage, as well as introduce them to prayer methods from other faith traditions that we have adapted for this Christian setting. All children from age 3 through sixth grade are welcome in our Sunday school.

Workshops include drama, kitchen, movie, art, and story. We have adapted the Tibetan Buddhist tradition of hanging prayer flags as a way to teach children the different types of prayer, based on the ACTS model: **A**doration, **C**onfession, **T**hanksgiving, and **S**upplication. We will work together to make pretzels and learn the long tradition of their connection to prayer. The children will experience simple yoga, movement prayer, and breath prayers and, weather permitting, walk with their teachers to a local outdoor labyrinth or use a canvas labyrinth in a classroom. Education for Ministry

A program of Theological Education by Extension

EfM has been offered at Trinity Episcopal Church in Towson for several years. The group meets Wednesday evenings from 6:30 to 9:00 and is mentored by The Rev. Anthony Hollis, priest, and The Rev. Linda Hollis, deacon. Several other parishes and other denominations make up the group. Trinity Church is easily accessed from all three Towson exits.

Every baptized person is called to ministry. During the service of confirmation we ask God to “Renew in these your servants the covenant you made with them at Baptism. Send them forth in the power of the Spirit to perform the service you set before them.” The Education for Ministry Program (EfM) provides people with an opportunity to discover how to respond to the call to Christian service and carry out their ministries.

Laypersons face the difficult and often subtle task of interpreting the richness of the church’s faith in a complex and confusing world. They need a theological education, which supports their faith and also trains them to express that faith in day-to-day events. As the emphasis on lay ministry has grown in the latter part of the twentieth century and into the twenty-first, EfM has come to be an important part of that growth by providing an informed and knowledgeable laity.

The seminar group is the nucleus of the Education for Ministry program. A group consists of six to eleven participants and a trained mentor meeting weekly over the course of a nine-month academic year. These meetings are usually from two and a half to three hours in length. Through study, prayer, and reflection, EfM groups move toward a new understanding of the fullness of God’s kingdom. Participants are given weekly assignments to study with the help of resource guides. They are responsible for setting their own learning goals. They spend between two and four hours in study and preparation each week. In the seminars members have an opportunity to share their insights and discoveries as well as to discuss questions, which the study materials raise for them.

More important is the development of skills in theological reflection. The goal is to learn to think theologically. By examining their own beliefs and their relationship to our culture and the tradition of our Christian faith, participants can learn what it means to be effective ministers in the world. In coming to terms with the notion that everything we do has the potential for manifesting the love of Christ, we discover that our ministry is at hand wherever we turn.

The Education for Ministry program is a four-year curriculum. Each “year” is a nine-month cycle of study. Students enroll for one cycle at a time. EfM grants 18 Continuing Education Units (CEU) for each year of study. There are no examinations or papers. EfM does not grant college credits. Because Maryland is a participating diocese in the program the annual tuition is \$340. Some scholarship funds are available.

These are aspects of our life that we may take for granted. I hope not, since we have them as a result of considerable cost and effort. Let Your Requests Be Known to God



In the Epistle to the Philippians (4:6), Paul writes, “let your requests be made known to God, and the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus.” There is usually a time of silence in every service when we can “name before God those for whom we wish to pray,” as we say at the Thursday Noon Service of Prayer for Healing. Let me encourage you to use that time to pray aloud the intercessions you bring with you to our common worship.

People often ask the clergy to put names on the prayer list. Inevitably, this often happens at the back of the church, or at Coffee Hour, times when it is hardest for clergy to remember these requests. Now that the Foyer of the Ward Center is painted and fresh, the Prayer Request Desk has been re-established. You can always tell the clergy about your prayer requests, but now you can also write your requests in the Request Book provided. The list will be checked each week before the Thursday Service and before the Prayers of the People are written for Sunday, so that your requests can be made known to God in the worship of the church. – *from Jim Ransom*


Confirmation Class

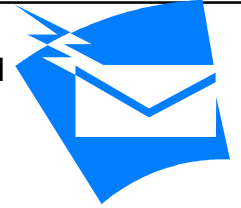
